

# Newsletter January 2023

### **Excursions**

Our first two Christmas/New Year public excursions (27<sup>th</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup> December 2022) were fully booked which was great news for us. Following these two excursions, GCVR maintenance volunteers worked on Friday 30<sup>th</sup> December to empty the boiler and clean out both the fire-box and smoke-box of Wa165, then again on Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> January (what holiday?) to refill and heat the boiler water up for the 9:00 am departure of the cruise ship Silver Muse charter on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> January. We carried 110 out of the maximum of 596 passengers that the ship can carry and there were some very avid steam train enthusiasts among them! Our 3<sup>rd</sup> public excursion for this period ran that same afternoon (a very busy day) with the 4<sup>th</sup> public excursion running the next day - 3<sup>rd</sup> January. Both of those public excursions were also fully booked.

10 days later, the cruise ship Le Laperouse berthed at Eastland Port Wharf 8. The passengers were taken by bus directly from the ship's gangway to the train boarding area in front of the Senator Motor Inn for their trip out to Muriwai.

The Muriwai School was back in action with their Kapa Haka (1) – their first one for this year, with many of their Whanau also present. An excellent turn-out remembering that it was still the school holidays and also a Saturday. Their efforts were certainly appreciated by the cruise ship passengers.

On arrival back in Gisborne, the passengers were taken from the train directly back to the ship as the ship was due to leave at 12:30pm, after having arrived at 7:00am that morning – a very short visit to Gisborne.

(1) For our international readers, a Kapa Haka is traditional Māori action songs performed by a group standing in rows. Very popular with our cruise ship passengers. The money earned from these performances enables the 30 pupil school to purchase items for their pupils that they would not otherwise be able to afford.

One of the cruise ship Expedition Guides informed us that the West Coast coal that we use is probably the best quality coal in Australasia and is **only** around 50 million years old (does that mean that it is too young to smoke?).

A very busy start to the year with another 3 cruise ship charters (2 on the same day) and 1 more public excursion scheduled during January.

However, after the departure of ex-cyclone Hale, a track inspection was carried out on Friday 13<sup>th</sup> January - the day prior to the train running. This inspection was to check for any problems caused by the storm.

Joe & Graham had also been out on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> January (3 days before the scheduled excursion) to check on the Waiapoa rail bridge – apparently the river flow was very swift and they could feel the bridge vibrating with the force of the water. No damage was apparent.
